#### **Guest Speaker: Bernd Mueller**

So you want to go canoeing? PROBUS member **Bernd Mueller** showed photos of some of his canoe trips in Algonquin Park. He and his friend Paul go in the spring before the flies and crowds of canoeists come out or in the fall after they're gone.

**Bernd** and **Paul** each bring light weight one-man canoes and light weight equipment. **Bernd** showed us a kettle that weighs only five or six ounces and a woodburning stove that sparks up with two AA batteries. **Bernd's** tent weighs three pounds.

**Bernd** and **Paul** bring freeze dried meals in pouches. All food tastes better in the woods. Cans and bottles are banned in the park. Water must be boiled or run through a small purifier. Tarps protect against wind and rain.

**Bernd** likes to bring a folding chair and a folding saw to cut wood for campfires. The park has no cell phone service. Park fees for seniors are \$10 a day.

The park has plenty of portages between lakes. One portage, known as the Devil's Staircase, is half a kilometre straight up. Stay clear of the moose. They're dangerous when riled.

Why go canoeing? **Bernd's** photos of magnificent lakes, fall colours, animals, birds, sunrises and sunsets were explanation enough.

**President Murray** introduced **Bernd** and thanked him for presenting to us the wonders of Algonquin Park.

#### Who Am I: Tom Vandertuin

**Tom Vandertuin** was born in the Netherlands in 1946. Just before his sixth birthday, his family emigrated to the Brantford area. When **Tom** arrived, he spoke no English but he soon learned it from the kids at school.

**Tom** grew up in Mount Pleasant and graduated from Brantford Collegiate Institute. **Tom** apprenticed and became a licensed electrician. In 1967, he married a Waterford girl named **Auk**. The couple have five children, four boys and a girl.

In 1971, **Tom** started his own business called Thomas Electric. High interest rates made it tough to survive. In 1986, **Tom** started a 25-year career as an electrical inspector, first with Ontario Hydro and later with the Electical Safety Authority. Tom retired as supervisor of the Hamilton office, which covered a large area from Simcoe to Burlington.

In 1993, **Tom** and his wife bought a chicken farm on Townsend Concession 13, east of Renton. Tom knew what he was in for because his father had a chicken farm. Tom
