Guest Speaker: Samantha Pacheco

Samantha Pacheco told us about Norfolk County's Community Paramedics Program. The program treats patients in their homes to prevent health care issues becoming emergencies. Patients get better, more timely care. It reduces time spent in hospital.

Samantha is the daughter of PROBUS member Mike Kite. She was born in Thunder Bay and is a graduate of Niagara College. She, her husband and five kids live in Simcoe.

In 2019, Samantha joined Norfolk's new community paramedics program, which has six staff and runs 12 hours a day. Hopefully, it will expand to 24 hours a day. It most commonly deals with heart problems, breathing and diabetes. Paramedics will check blood pressure, listen to lungs and check weight. Paramedics often identify need for other services such as home care, Alzheimer's support and mental health services.

About 120 people are on the program. Service is free.

Paramedics are the first eyes into many homes. Some people have not seen their doctors during the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result, paramedics have seen decline in some patients' health. For seniors without families, paramedics will give shots and check blood sugar levels for diabetics.
