Guest Speaker: Anita Buehner

What do you do with a tobacco farm after it no longer grows tobacco? For **Anita** and **Steve Buehner**, the answer was to replace tobacco with two new crops — first lavender and second grapes. The result is **Bonnieheath Estate Lavender and Winery**.

The farm is on Concession 14 of former Townsend township, just north of Simcoe, between Cockshutt Road and the Blueline Road. The name, Bonnieheath, comes from the house next door, which 100 years ago was owned by **Col. Walter Heath**. The sandy soil grew tobacco for 60 years until 2008, when the tobacco quota system ended. Anita's parents purchased the farm in 1974 and passed it along to Anita and Steve in 1990.

In 2009, Steve attended a lavender conference in Washington State. He decided to give the crop a try, starting plants in the Bonnieheath greenhouse and transplanting them under landscape fabric in the fields. Today the farm has 12,000 lavender plants, all planted and harvested by hand.





Lavender blooms from mid-June to early August. The Buehners sell a variety of lavender products,

including soap, candles and tea, all made on the farm. A distillery produces lavender essential oils.

Bonnieheath is an estate winery, which means its wines are made from grapes grown on the property. Currently, the Buehners sell five red varieties of wine and four white varieties. There's even a lavender ice wine. The Buehners have created a wetland planted with native vegetation. Prairie grasses grow two metres tall.

PLEASE NOTE: PROBUS will tour Bonnieheath in place of our regular meeting on July 10. **Dick Pearson** will ask at our May meeting how many members and guests would plan to attend. The basic tour is free. A wagon tour of the farm costs \$6 per person.
