Guest Speaker: Imam Abu Noman Tarek

Abu Noman Tarek, Imam of the Brantford Mosque, introduced us to the basics of the Islam religion. He has served as an Imam, teacher, chaplain, educator and consultant in Canada for more than 10 years.

Imam Tarek holds three bachelor's degrees in Islamic studies; literature, arts and history; and computer science and engineering and a master's degree in Ulumul Hadith (the unchanged word of God as revealed to Prophet Muhammad) from renowned universities in Bangladesh and other parts of the world, including Canada. He is married and blessed with two daughters. He lives in Brantford.

The word "Islam" means peace and submission. It is a way to find peace by submitting to God. A Muslim is a person who follows Islam.

Muslims believe Abraham, Moses and Jesus were messengers from God. In addition, Muhammad came 1,500 years ago (610 CE) as a global and last prophet. The Quran is an unchanging message of God for humanity until the Day of Judgment.

No humans are divine. Some people do not submit to God fully and sometimes wrongfully interpret Quran to justify their sins and wrong acts such as ISIS. ISIS is neither Islamic nor has a state. Islam does not support any form of terrorism or extremism. The Quran says: "Whoever kills a person (unjustly) . . . it is as though he has killed all mankind. And whoever saves a life, it is as though he had saved all mankind."

Islam gives rights to women and respects them. Abuse of women arises from culture and not from Islam.

Some principles of Islam:

- There is only One God and Muhammad was the last messenger of God;
- People have freedom of choice and God knows everything;
- People are here to live good lives leading to eternal life;
- Every adult Muslim must pray five times a day;
- Muslims give to charity and fast from dawn to dusk during Ramadan;
- Muslims, if they are eligible, pilgrimage to Mecca once during their lives;
- God will judge people according to their good and bad deeds;
- Shia and Sunni Muslims are divided by politics.


Who Am I: Gus Takacs

Gus Takacs was born in 1934 about six miles outside Simcoe. His family moved to Lynnville where his father was a sharecropper on the Windham tobacco plantation.

Gus and family returned to their homeland of Hungary for a short while then came back to Canada for good in 1938.

The family lived at Rodney in Elgin County then moved to Teeterville where his father again sharecropped. In 1946, Gus graduated from public school and, through a mixup, went to high school for a few weeks in Delhi. After things got straightened out, Gus went to high school in Waterford and Simcoe.

Gus took photography for three months at Ryerson Institute of Technology, but it failed to develop into a career. On Jan. 2, 1953, Gus joined the Canadian Bank of Commerce. He worked at banks in Mitchell and Long Branch then, in 1956, he came to the bank in Simcoe, where he lived "the exciting life of a Canadian banker" until his retirement in 1994.


