Guest Speaker: Gary White

Gary White got interested in fireworks when he was about 10 years old growing up in Port Dover. His father made fireworks and so began Gary's love for black powder, fireworks and, as an adult, amateur rocketry.

Now in retirement, and living again in Port Dover, **Gary** continues to have a blast with his fireworks hobby. **Gary** has a licence to set off commercial displays. Last July 1, he helped set off Port Dover's spectacular Canada Day display, shooting off \$10,000 worth of fireworks in 20 minutes.

There are two types of fireworks. One is home fireworks, which anyone can set off in their backyard for Victoria Day and Canada Day. The second type is commercial fireworks, which can be bought and set off only by a licensed person like **Gary**. Commercial displays need a permit from Norfolk County or other local municipality.

Black powder (also known as gunpowder) was invented in China around 900 BC. It's

made of charcoal, sulphur and stump remover aka potassium nitrate. Today China is our source for black powder and fireworks. **Gary** explained how fireworks work, including skyrockets, Roman candles, fountains, flares, and multi-shot fireworks called cakes.

Fireworks can be lit with a fuse or electronically. Bigger displays, such as at Niagara Falls, could cost \$100,000. A Times Square display could cost \$500,000.

In decades of fireworks, **Gary** has never had an accident. "I'm still running fast enough to get away," **Gary** said.
